<p><b>GOAL</b></p> <p>To increase protections against syphilis, HIV*, gonorrhea, and chlamydia to decrease rates of new cases.</p> <p><b>OBJECTIVE 1</b></p> <p>Prevent new syphilis, HIV, gonorrhea, and chlamydia cases and see case rates begin to decline by 2029.</p> <p><b>OBJECTIVE 2</b></p> <p>Provide targeted outreach to populations most at risk of contracting syphilis, HIV, gonorrhea, and chlamydia to reduce rates.</p> <p><a href="#">LEARN MORE</a></p>	<p><b>GOAL</b></p> <p>To increase awareness of ACEs** and how childhood trauma affects the wellbeing of adolescents.</p> <p><b>OBJECTIVE 1</b></p> <p>Support school districts to increase mental health protective factors to decrease reported depressive and anxiety factors in students by 5%.</p> <p><b>OBJECTIVE 2</b></p> <p>Increase opportunities for health education surrounding ACEs to decrease reported suicidal ideation in students by 5%.</p> <p><a href="#">LEARN MORE</a></p>	<p><b>GOAL</b></p> <p>To increase outreach and education about risk factors for fatal opioid-associated overdoses.</p> <p><b>OBJECTIVE 1</b></p> <p>Decrease opioid-associated fatal overdoses by 5%.</p> <p><b>OBJECTIVE 2</b></p> <p>Decrease risk factors for accidental drug ingestion in children under age five by 5%.</p> <p><a href="#">LEARN MORE</a></p>

## SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS STRATEGIES:

Strategy 1: Engage with partners who work with populations most at risk to continue education efforts and prevent the spread of disease.

Strategy 2: Collaborate with partners to create culturally sensitive educational resources.

Strategy 3: Work alongside partners to share data and resources.

Strategy 4: Invite clinical partners to community testing events.



## MENTAL HEALTH STRATEGIES:

Strategy 1: Increase protective factors by collaborating with schools to develop MOUs, peer-led mental wellbeing campaigns, and mental health educational materials.

Strategy 2: Create a communication model around how to talk about ACEs in schools and the community.

Strategy 3: Culturally adapt suicide prevention trainings, educational materials, and resources.



## SUBSTANCE MISUSE STRATEGIES:

Strategy 1: Educate about safe drug storage, disposal, accidental ingestion trends, and emergency response.

Strategy 2: Expand naloxone access and education.

Strategy 3: Promote existing harm reduction efforts and reduce stigma surrounding substance use disorders.

Strategy 4: Identify and define which communities and populations are considered high-risk for fatal opioid-associated overdoses.
